FINDING THE HOLY IN THE SHADOWS

We often treat faith like a bright, polished room where everything is in its right place and the shadows are kept at bay. But if we are honest, the history of Christianity—and our own personal lives—isn't always a straight line of light. Over the centuries, the Church has frequently traded the radical way of Jesus for the power of empires, used shame to silence those struggling with mental health, and marginalized the very voices, like Mary Magdalene's, that first carried the Gospel. This January, we aren't going to look away from these difficult truths. Instead, we are stepping directly into them with our new series, God in the Shadows: Rediscovering the Holy in the Dark Side of Christianity.

By confronting the ways the Church has been used to control or exclude, we clear the path to rediscover a God who meets us in our complexity, our addiction, our doubt, and our humanity. We are looking for the "Holy" that doesn't require us to pretend we are perfect, but instead invites us to be honest so that we can finally be free. Whether you are navigating your own "shadow season," deconstructing what you were taught as a child, or simply looking for a faith that is big enough to handle the truth, there is a seat for you here. We will explore how Jesus calls the church to be holier than the world's power structures and how his grace bridges the chasms we thought were permanent.


Mary Magdalene & Women


HELP INVITE OTHERS TO EXPERIENCE FUMC!

2026 - 2027 FUMC SCHOLARSHIPS

The FUMC Scholarship Committee announced the application process for the 2026-2027 academic year opened on December 15, 2025. For more than twenty years the Scholarship Committee of FUMC, in conjunction with the Foundation and First Company, have presented scholarships to active members, both youth and adults, who wish to pursue advanced education at technical schools, colleges, or universities, as well as theological seminaries. Over this time the scholarships for academics as well as youth choir and youth mission trips have totaled more than \$243,000.


TABLES OF GRACE WINTER/SPRING 2026



CARING MINISTRIES

Stewardship of the Soul: Caring for Yourself So You Can Care for Others

As we turn the page to 2026, the air is often filled with talk of "resolutions"—demands we place on ourselves to do more, be more, and work harder. But in our Caring Ministries, we see a different need. We see hearts that are weary, hands that are tired from serving, and spirits that need the same gentle care they so freely give to others.

This year, we invite you to view "self-care" not as a modern luxury, but as a spiritual discipline of stewardship.

The Theology of Rest

Scripture reminds us that we are not infinite; we are beautifully, intentionally human. Jesus himself frequently "withdrew to lonely places and prayed" (Luke 5:16). He recognized that to pour out love, he needed to be filled by the Father.

Self-care is an act of worship. When we honor our need for sleep, healthy food, and quiet, we are honoring the "temple of the Holy Spirit" (1 Corinthians 6:19). We are acknowledging that the world rests on God's shoulders, not ours.

Putting it into Practice

Our Caring Ministry team suggests these three "Soul-Care" shifts for the New Year:

- The Sabbath Heart: You may not be able to take a full 24 hours, but can you find a "Sabbath Hour"? A time where productivity is paused and your only "job" is to enjoy God's presence.
- Holy Boundaries: Saying "no" to one more commitment is often a "yes" to your family, your health, and your spiritual clarity.
- Receive as You Give: If you are a natural caregiver, it can be hard to be the one receiving help. This year, allow someone to bring you a meal or sit with you in prayer. Vulnerability is a bridge to community.

This memorial is organized by individuals every year to remember the precious lives lost who were part of the unhoused community in Colorado Springs. There was beautiful music shared, candles lit and lifted, and the singing of "Silent Night". It was a moving and sacred experience.

Friends, the list of deceased (including the name of our dear FUMC friend, Daniel Parsons) was unusually long. These unique and unrepeatable children of God were honored by the reading of their names, followed by the reverent crowd proclaiming, "We will remember."

This memorial is held every year on Dec. 21 at Evergreen Cemetery, just inside the front entrance.

SUNDAY MICRO MISSIONS - SMALL MOMENTS, BIG IMPACT

When we hear the words "mission work," we often imagine trekking through remote jungles or committing to month-long service trips abroad. While those journeys are vital, the heart of a mission is simply service in action. Believe it or not, you can fulfill a powerful mission right here at church—and it only takes 30 minutes on a Sunday morning/afternoon.

Beginning in January, you can participate in micro mission projects for 15-30 minutes, as your energy level and time allow. Each week, we will provide supplies and space for you to engage with outreach and service to our community. Projects include, but are not limited to:

Make and Take Care Bags for the Unhoused. These care bags can include a variety of items that you can then take with you when you leave and hand out from your car whenever you see someone asking for help.

Food Bags. These bags are distributed through the welcome desk here at FUMC. When our unhoused guests come in, they are offered a food bag to help sustain them throughout the day.

Encouragement to Others. This micro mission project includes making cards to encourage various other organizations who serve in our community. Throughout the year we will focus on nursing home employees, those who work with hospice, families being supported by suicide prevention centers, and young people who are marginalized or struggling.

Every 3rd Sunday, we offer a hands-on mission experience called Rides for Rubbish. We partner with some of our unhoused friends in doing our part for the environment by picking up trash.

January 25 - Cards for clients at Inside Out Youth Services.




JUSTICE LEAGUE FORMATION COMING

Human Relations Day is a special Sunday across our denomination, focused on fostering better relationships and supporting community and youth outreach. On the Sunday before Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday, we take up a special offering to help bring his vision of a "beloved community" to life, making these ministries possible:

- Community Developers Program (57%)
- This program helps churches serve their neighborhoods—especially communities of color—by focusing on local needs like education, employment, and empowerment.
- United Methodist Voluntary Services (33%)
- This program equips volunteers and congregations to tackle injustice through hands-on projects, community organizing, and service-learning opportunities.
- Youth Offender Rehabilitation Programs (10%)
- These church-supported programs help young people rebuild their lives through mentoring, leadership training, and positive, faith-based community experiences.






